Beneficial Insects:

All of us have been taught that there are beneficial insects and they help nature to preserve a balance by keeping pests at bay and some beneficial insects that help us produce food. Some people still think that the only good bug is a dead bug and this is most certainly wrong. Some of us believe that certain insects are beneficial when they actually are determinantal and that can also be a problem especially if people release to many of these and produce an overpopulation to the detriment of the natural balance of nature. Cuttings:

Our May meeting was about propagation by taking cuttings. It was presented by Nancy Steinecker, who is an Allen County Master Gardener Volunteer. She talked to us about how to take the cuttings from plants. In some plants the cuttings need to be rooted before they can be cut from the plant. Although most of the ones that were discussed needed only to be properly cut with a growth node for the roots to start at and at least some foliage to keep the plant alive and growing. Some of the more common plants that you can successfully propagate this way are geraniums and coleus. There are many more that can be propagated this could inspire some of us to try it out.

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Stop and Think:

Are you about to make a mistake? Is it really time to plant those tender plants outside? Take a step back and put that tomato down you will not get any tomatoes if you are not ready to protect that young plant. Many people want to get a jump on the season by planting earlier than they should. Remember we can still get a killing frost as late as Memorial Day even though the frost free date is usually May10-15 we are one week ahead of our normal spring and that is by no means a reason to plant now. If you plant tender plants now I would suggest that you use something to protect them like a wall-o-water or a rose cone with the top cut out and if we get a threat of frost all you have to do is, nothing for the wall-o-water but you have to cover the top of the rose cone. Have fun this Spring.
