Message from our president, Victoria Zeits

Hey Folks - If you haven't been out to our Community Garden (9900 S. Main St. - Bluffton), its time to take a walk/cycle/drive out there, or take a virtual tour on our Facebook Page (https://www.facebook.com/ GardenersoftheBlufftonPandoraArea/). Due to some dry weather in early April, we were able to get the entire garden tilled earlier than normal, and open it to our local gardeners for Cold Crop planting. We've invested in pressure treated wood for our 4'x8' raised beds in our Discovery Area.

The response from Blufftonites to get outside and play in the dirt has been great. All except 1 of our large plots (a 25'x50') plot, and 7 out of 26 of our Discovery Plots are taken, and we haven't gotten to our May 15th frost free date yet! Most of the folks in both the large and small plots have put in cold weather crops like: pea's, potato, celery, cabbage, kale, kohlrabi, radishes, onions, garlic and more. There is a Cold Crop demo plot at the front of the Discovery area, which will shortly have a description grid. Later there will also be demo plots for hot crops and flowers, all using the Square Foot Gardening method.

The perennial flowers in the Monarch Waystation are all coming out of hibernation with the exception of the Milkweeds (7 types), which are holding out for some warmer weather.
