I think we are all hoping for some warmer weather and looking forward to spring! Delays and cancellations have wreaked havoc on many families' schedules, so the hope is that better weather is right around the corner. Current weather disruptions aside, the first semester went very well, and it is hard to believe that we are already into the last week of January. Our students and staff continue to work very hard to keep our district's performance index on assessments in the top 6% of all schools in the state.

In order for our district to be prepared for the new assessments being rolled out in the 2014-2015 school year, we were granted a Race to the Top Grant four years ago. The 2013-2014 school year marks the last year for our district's implementation of the new standards and preparation for the new state assessments beginning 2014-2015. Thanks to the Race to the Top Grant, we received \$25,000 annually for four years, which helped with the purchase of student response systems ("clickers") at various grade levels. These monies also helped absorb the cost of staff development for our Race to the Top Transformation Leadership Team. This team, made up of teachers and administrators, has done an outstanding job of creating and offering professional development opportunities for our staff in preparation for the new assessments. In particular, this group has worked to emphasize formative instructional practices (FIP) in order to transition students to the state's new learning standards. Formative assessments allow teachers to more specifically focus on students' learning needs and to be able to implement remediation strategies that will aid students in being as successful as possible. The new state assessments will be more challenging and will demand increased critical thinking skills among students. Our district will be a pilot school this spring for some of these new assessments; fortunately, this will give us some initial insight into these tests.

Also as part of the Race to the Top Grant, the 2013-2014 school year is the first for the new Ohio Teacher Evaluation System (OTES). Our teachers and principals have been working hard at implementing this time-consuming and rigorous evaluation system. OTES is based on a combination of teacher performance standards and student growth measures. The teacher performance standards consist of formal classroom observations and walk-throughs/informal observations, as well as a pre-conference, post-conference, and complete performance rubric. The student growth measures include a variety of elements which seek to quantify student growth from one year to the next. Some of these growth measurements will be derived from the State Ohio

Achievement Assessments that are given in Math and Language Arts in grades 3-8. Obtaining the growth measures for other academic areas is something that our district will be working on in order to obtain the complete student-growth measure per teacher. The system is not perfect, but we are working hard to make the system as effective as possible.

In other news, the district would like to thank Mr. Larry Eikenbary for his 15+ years of dedication to our district and Mr. Ned Niswander for his 35 years of service. Both of these custodians made outstanding contributions to our district. They will be missed, and we wish them each a happy retirement.

In closing, thank you for being supportive of our school district, and as I have said many times, we have such great parents, students, staff, and community members that it is an honor to be a part of this school system.

The first half of the 2013-2014 school year has been filled with numerous fun and educational events. Many enriching activities have taken place inside and outside our classrooms.

In September, students were entertained by Jim "Basketball" Jones. While performing many basketball tricks, he focused the students on making good choices, respecting others, being responsible, and being safe.

October brought several events. Art Beat began its 29th year with students in grades two through five. Featured artists for this year are Rene Magritte, Frederic Remington, John W. Turner, Edgart Degas and Victor Vasarely. We celebrated Red Ribbon Week to promote a drug-free life. Kindergarten through second grade students enjoyed a Safety Pup assembly provided by the Bluffton Police Department.

Other events occurred at all grade levels.

<u>Kindergarten</u> students were excited for the new activities. They enjoyed their annual field trip to Suter's pumpkin patch. They participated in the Apple Program, which introduces students to a variety of materials that children with disabilities use to learn and play. Students learned about the five senses during a SESA program (Science Enhancement for Science Advancement - a partnership between Allen County Schools and their industry partners).

<u>First graders</u> were busy. They attended Operation Band-Aid at the Bluffton Hospital and toured the Swiss Historical Homestead. The Bluffton Fire Department gave presentations to our K-1st graders for Fire Prevention Week. Keeping with tradition, students enjoyed a ride on the old fire truck. They also enjoyed a SESA program about animal habitats and are currently working on their animal reports.

The <u>second grade</u> children experienced a variety of activities. They enjoyed a weather demonstration by SESA. During a visit to the Lion and Lamb Center, they discussed differences in people by doing a drumming session with beats and rhythm. They attended the Young People's Concert at the Lima Civic Center.

<u>Third graders</u> had fun. They visited the Allen County Museum to learn about local history and enjoyed two SESA presentations (States of Matter and Forms of Energy).

The <u>fourth graders</u> were diligent students. They participated in two SESA programs (Exploring Electricity and States of Matter). They visited Maple Crest for their Lion and Lamb presentation, and then, for the holidays, they sang Christmas carols and played their recorders for some of the residents.

<u>Fifth grade</u> students were excited and busy. Recently they began the popular DARE program, which lasts several weeks. They also participated in a hands-on SESA presentation pertaining to Newton's Laws.

November was a busy month. The Moxie Strings entertained all the elementary students with their feel-good melodies and foot-stomping, rock-influenced rhythms that put a fresh, fun spin on Celtic and Americana music. Parent Teacher Conferences were held, and 98% of our students were represented by at least one parent, an outstanding show of parental support. We are grateful for the veterans who gave presentations to our students in honor of Veterans' Day. The elementary library and the P.T.O. sponsored a Book Fair which helped raise funds to purchase additional library and classroom books. COSI-On-Wheels, an annual event funded by Allen

County's SESA program, presented Investigating Energy to students in grades three through five.

A flurry of activity could be found in our building during this past Christmas season. Second graders worked hard in their Santa's workshop to make Christmas gifts. Our students displayed their musical talents with an instrumental concert (grades 4 & 5) and the elementary Christmas program. Both were well-attended and supported by family and friends. We are very proud of our students. For their annual Christmas service project, the elementary staff and students collected over \$1,600 for Philippine relief. This was a great opportunity for our students to help others during the Christmas season. Thank you for your support.

We are grateful for the many volunteers in the elementary school. On any given day we have parents and community members helping our staff by tutoring or assisting in various activities or projects. We appreciate the tutors involved with the Project MORE reading program. Fourteen volunteers serve 23 children for this program. We also receive invaluable support from our P.T.O., which helps to organize volunteers for events such as COSI-On-Wheels, special-event meals for teachers, popcorn for the Christmas movies, and raising funds through various sources such as Bakery Bingo, BoxTops for Education, and Market Day.

Finally, I would like to congratulate all teachers, staff, parents, and students for achieving all positive marks on the District Report Card. It was the eighth consecutive year that all indicators of the elementary report card were achieved. This is the sixth year we achieved the rating of "Excellent with Distinction". News from Bluffton High School Mike Minnig, High School Principal

It hardly seems possible that we have reached the halfway mark of the 2013-2014 school year.

I am constantly amazed by the talents and work ethic that our students, teachers, and staff possess. Our teachers have been working hard with the implementation of the many changes in our state's educational system. Our students are continuing to perform at a high level in the classroom as over 200 students have been accepted into the Renaissance Program.

Our student body is very involved in a number of extracurricular and co-curricular activities, with over 70% of our students involved in at least one activity. This fall 95 of our student-athletes were named NWC Scholar-Athletes, an honor awarded to those student-athletes who maintain a 3.0 G.P.A. while earning a varsity letter.

Our students continue to excel in our musical arts programs. The band and choir students did an excellent job with their concerts as did the Drama Club with its production of <u>Parents Just Don't Understand</u>. These students are preparing for future performances, including a musical <u>Extra Extra</u> in the spring and their monthly **Senior Citizen Breakfast Performances**. These performances all start at 8:30 in the middle school cafetorium and on the following dates: Feb 12 – Freshmen Choir, Mar 12 – Concert Band, Apr 9 – Drama Club, and May 14 – Jazz Band.

We will begin our student scheduling process for next year around mid-February. Students will receive scheduling materials and have curriculum changes explained to them. Please review with your child what courses she/he plans to take and how these courses relate to the student's future.

OGT Week will start on March 10 with many different activities taking place. The sophomores will be taking the Ohio Graduation Test while the freshmen will be taking a practice OGT test. The juniors will be working on ACT prep, and the seniors will be preparing and presenting their cross-curricular research project.

The following are some highlights of the first part of the school year:

 The economics class attended a Financial Day seminar, sponsored by Superior Federal Credit Union, at UNOH in September.

- Congratulations to Andrew Hoff, Josh Garmatter, Olivia Sneary, and Emma Woodruff for each being named student-of-themonth. Each of these students received a savings bond from either Citizen's National Bank, Chase Bank, or First National Bank of Pandora.
- The PSAT, Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, was given to many of our sophomores and juniors in October.

 These students work with 4th and 5th graders to enhance their academic progress.
- The anatomy & physiology classes experienced a live knee replacement through COSI via distance learning. Students were able to interact with the surgeon by asking questions throughout the surgery.
- A Financial Aid Night was offered to parents in December. Lawrence Matthews, Director of Financial Aid at Bluffton University, was on hand to talk about the financial aid process and the FAFSA form.
- The junior class attended a College Career Day at Rhodes State College in December. Students picked three careers of interest.
 Type of work, job setting, education needed, and benefits earned were discussed regarding their choices.
- All 16 student senate members donated their time and effort for a community service day in December.
- Students and staff did a great job with the Toys for Tots campaign in the high school office.
- Our SADD club, Students Against Destructive Decisions, passed out red Bluffton Pirate wristbands to students who signed a pledge to stay drug and alcohol free during Red Ribbon Week. The SADD club has also held a few after- game parties for students during the basketball season.



Tech Tip: Print Screen!?!

Ever wonder what happens when you press the PrtScn (Print Screen) key on the keyboard? The short answer is it copies and pastes whatever is on your monitor to the clipboard (memory). The best way to find out is to try it. Press the key, and it appears nothing happens. Now, open a blank document in your favorite word processing tool; then click edit and paste. You should now have a picture of your computer's desktop in your document. Crop and size the image as necessary. As an additional test, try holding the "alt" key down before pressing the print screen key to capture the active window on your computer instead of the whole desktop. This is a great tool to quickly collect info to save and/or send to a friend or colleague. It is especially helpful to tech guys trying to figure out what a "pop-up" message on your computer means.
